Wheat plot yield results have been compiled

For the most part, wheat harvest ers. Yields were variable, but for the

wheat plots have been compiled with good yields being recorded. At Decatur, Sheridan, Gove, and Trego county, a comparison of fourteen varieties and one blend were planted at 85 lbs/A in both no-till and conventional-tilled stubble. Tam 111 was the highest yielding variety in both tillage systems with an average across sites of 78.6 bu/A in no-till and 68.0 bu/A in conventional-till. The rest of the top five in no-till was Jagalene at 71.2, NuHills at a 70.3, Jagger at 66.5, and Wesley at 66.3 bu/A. For the conventional-till, the second highest average yield was Jagalene at 63.0 followed by T-81 at 62.3, NuHills at 61.7, and Jagger at 60.4 bu/A. When averaging across the four sites and all the vari-



bu/A, while conventional-till yielded 57.7 bu/A.

There was also a seeding rate comparison of Jagalene planted at all four sites. In the no-till, the results for the 68 lbs/A seeding rate were 64.2, 85 lbs/A at 71.2, 102 lbs/ A at 67.7, and 120 lbs/A at 65.2 bu/ A. In the conventional-till, little difference was seen with 68 lbs/A vielding 61.2, 85 lbs/A at 63.0, 102 lbs/A at 62.6, and 120 lbs/A at 62.7

At Norton, no no-till comparison was planted. All varieties were lanted conventional-till with Overley yielding 61.3 bu/A followed by Cutter at 60.8, NuHills at 56.4, T812 SV at 54.9, and Jagger and 54.9 bu/A.

When looking at these results, farmers should keep in mind that picking a variety that has performed well over multiple locations and different planting environments will be a better choice to plant than just looking at one location.

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
