"Our roads down here haven't been mowed all summer long and the weeds are six to seven-feet tall," Mr. Ninemire said, explaining that he had hit a deer, which jumped out of the weeds last week. "It's not very safe to drive along

these roads at night. These weeds are just way out of control," he Mr. Brannan said that the prob-

lem was a broken piece on the mower, which is used in that area of the county.

"We didn't forget about you," he assured Mr. Ninemire. "We'll get there as soon as we can."
