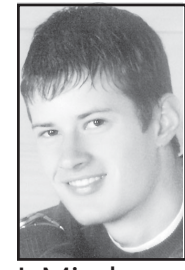


Students accept Rotary scholarships

Ambulance crew wants more teachers

The Norton County Ambulance service is gearing up to have more people who can teach cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

Ambulance Director Andy Nielsen and assistant Director Ruth Schillig told the Norton County Commissioners on Monday that they will be holding a class to train teachers.

Mr. Nielsen said that he is hoping to train several more instructors. Right now, only he, Diane Edgett and Shannon Goss are certified by the American Heart Association to give CPR classes.

Mr. Nielsen said that he hopes to start the course next month.

Right now, the ambulance service has a first responder class going with 10 students, he said.

Both Mrs. Schillig and her husband Aden have passed their class to help teach the first responder class.

The ambulance personnel are planning to set up a tent at the fair and, hopefully, get more surveys

filled out.

"Rural Fire Department wants to get a new truck too," Mr. Nielsen said. "It isn't only going to help the ambulance service."

The surveys are needed to prove that Norton is a low-income area. At least 80 percent of the residents need to fill out the forms so that the county can apply for a grant to help the ambulance service get a new home or remodel the old one.

In other business, the commis-

sioners:

- Held a 10-minute closed session with Mr. Nielsen and Mrs. Schillig to discuss non-elected personnel.
- Decided to interview an applicant for a full-time job with the emergency medical service.
- Learned that tires from Unit 4 are being transferred to a road and bridge department vehicle and the ambulance is getting new tires. The tires have 35,000 miles on them and the ambulance needs newer ones for its emergency runs, Mr. Nielsen said.

Broken mower leads to weedy problems

A broken mower is causing some problems for people living in the county near Lenora.

Jim Ninemire, Lenora, called the Norton County commissioners during their meeting on Monday to ask when the weeds along the roads near his place will be mowed.

Road and Bridge Supervisor Tom Brannan was there and was able to explain the problem.

"Our roads down here haven't been mowed all summer long and the weeds are six to seven-feet tall," Mr. Ninemire said, explaining that he had hit a deer, which jumped out of the weeds last week.

"It's not very safe to drive along these roads at night. These weeds are just way out of control," he said.

Mr. Brannan said that the problem was a broken piece on the mower, which is used in that area of the county.

"We didn't forget about you," he assured Mr. Ninemire. "We'll get there as soon as we can."

Mr. Brannan told the commissioners that the broken piece had been ordered but, when it didn't come in, he took the part to Miltech and they were making a new one for less cost than the ordered part.

Mr. Brannan said that bridge OS220, about 10 miles south of

Almena, is completed and his crew cleaned out some blocked drainage tubes at the same time.

Next, Mr. Brannan said he is closing off Road E4 at the state line for bridge replacement.

Everyone has been notified and equipment is being moved in, he said. The road will be closed down while work is being done, which will probably take about a month.

Mr. Brannan said that he had notified the Furnas County sheriff's office in Nebraska as well as the dispatch here.

Mr. Brannan also told the commissioners that he is meeting with engineers about a water line, which is to be put down as part of Almena's water project.

He said that they might want to put it on the county right-of-way.

"I don't have a problem if it's on our right of way if it's deep enough," he said but added that it would probably be better on private right-of-way.
