12 and Under team completes season

Back-to-back wins in the championship series over the No. 1 seeded Colby team brought Norton's record to 21-2.

Norton opened the tournament by defeating Goodland 18-4. On Friday, July 15, an exciting

game was played between Norton and WaKeeney.

The Blue Jays found themselves down 9-4 in the last inning. The Nortonites put their "rally caps" on and mounted a comeback. The tying run was scored with two outs as Ryan Blecha slid home, knocking off the catcher's glove and sending the game into an extra inning.

The Jays again found themselves down 11-9 in the bottom of the sixth. Landon Keiswetter scored the tying run when Spencer Shirk ripped a grounder to third. Two errant throws by WaKeeney allowed Shirk to stretch the single all the way home for the winning run. The final was 12-11.

On Saturday, the third day of the double-elimination tourney, Norton faced Colby, coached by Blake Arnberger. Norton was unable to keep pace and fell short, losing 7-5.

The loss forced an elimination game between Norton and WaKeeney.

Keiswetter pitched five strong innings and the Blue Jay bats woke up as the Jays won 8-4. Luke Ninemire and Justin Griffith produced key hits to jump-start the Norton offense. WaKeeney finished the tournament in third.

To keep their championship hopes alive, the Blue Jays faced the task of beating Colby in two straight.

Tuesday, July 26, 2005. (1T) **ORDINANCE NO. 1548**

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING TRAFFIC WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF NORTON, KANSAS: INCORPORATING BY REFERENCE THE "STANDARD TRAFFIC ORDINANCE FOR KANSAS CITIES," EDITION OF 2005; PROVIDING CERTAIN PENALTIES AND REPEALING ORDINANCE #1535. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF NORTON, KANSAS:

Section 1. INCORPORATING STANDARD TRAFFIC ORDINANCE. There is hereby incorporated by reference for the purpose of regulating traffic within the corporate limits of the City of Norton, Kansas, that certain standard traffic ordinance known as the "Standard Traffic Ordinance for Kansas Cities," Edition of 2005, prepared and published in book form by the League of Kansas Municipalities, Topeka, Kansas. No fewer than three copies of said Standard Traffic Ordinance shall be marked or stamped "Official Copy as Adopted by Ordinance No. 1548", and to which shall be attached a copy of this ordinance, and filed with the city clerk to be open to inspection and available to the public at all reasonable hours. The police department, municipal judge and all administrative departments of the city charged with enforcement of the ordinance shall be supplied, at the cost of the city, such number of official copies of such Standard Traffic Ordinance similarly marked, as may be deemed Darla R. Ellis, City Clerk expedient.

Published in The Norton Telegram on Section 2. TRAFFIC INFRACTIONS AND TRAFFIC OFFENSES

a.) An ordinance traffic infraction is a violation of any section of this ordinance that prescribes or requires the same behavior as that prescribed or required by a statutory provision that is classified as a traffic infraction in K. S.A. 8-2118. b.) All traffic violations which are included within this ordinance, and which are not ordinance traffic infractions, as defined in subsection (a) of this section, shall be considered traffic offenses.

Section 3. PENALTY FOR SCHEDULED FINES. The fine for violation of an ordinance traffic infraction or any other traffic offense for which the municipal judge establishes a fine in a fine schedule shall not be less than \$1 nor more than \$500, except for speeding which shall not be less than \$5 nor more than \$500. A person tried and convicted for violation of an ordinance traffic infraction or other traffic offense for which a fine has been established in a schedule of fines shall pay a fine fixed by the court not to exceed \$500.

Section 4. REPEAL. Ordinance number 1535 is hereby repealed.

Section 5. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the official city newspaper.
