Recruiter tells Lions 'U-Can'

Sgt. Joe Leroux was the guest speaker during the noon meeting of the Norton Lions Club on Tuesday.

Sgt. Leroux is the recruiting and retention non-commissioned officer for the Kansas Army National Guard. He has been stationed at Norton for a year.



He told members of the service organization about an upcoming event, Sept. 17-18, at Sebelius Reservoir called "Operation U-Can". The guard sponsors this weekend to give anyone that wants to try it, a taste of what life in the Army might be like. He invites everyone, "to spend a weekend in our world; eat Army chow; live like a soldier and sleep in tents."

Operation U-Can is open to anyone in the ninth grade and older. There is no cost for the weekend but you will be asked to sign a liability waiver.

Some of the events you will encounter are: the climbing wall, paintball (government equipment provided), rides in a Hum-Vee, map reading, camouflage application and weapon assembly and disassembly.

If you need transportation to the event, a bus and two shuttle buses will pick up "weekend warriors" in surrounding communities.

The weekend is designed as a recruiting tool, but it can be fun for people of all ages Sgt. Leroux said.

He went on to say that the National Guard can help with college educations. He said tuition can be paid as well as a student receiving a monthly stipend. Large signing bonuses are also available for hard-to-fill occupations in the military.

Sgt. Leroux concluded his presentation by informing the group that he is qualified to be a substitute teacher. He said he can't take any payment for his services but he can fill in for a public school teacher if need be and he has special classes he can teach like "conflict resolution", "anger management", and "how to survive a tornado".

Public television station awarded Hansen grant

Smoky Hills Public Television has been awarded a general support grant from the Dane G. Hansen Foundation. The grant is expected to be used for production of local programming. "We are grateful that the Dane G. Hansen Foundation recognizes the ways in which Smoky Hills Public Television enriches people's lives and makes Kansas a better place to live and work," General Manager Lawrence Holden noted in making the announcement, "Their support for Kansas programming helps make this programming available to all, only on Smoky Hills Public Television."

Call Norton County Health Department at 785-877-5745 PROFILE #1 "Health Profile & CBC" - \$40.00 Health Profile Contains: ELECTROLYTES: (Sodium, potassium, chloride and total carbon dioxide). These are major indicators of kidney and hormonal functions. Electrolytes are essential for the body's acid-base balance and the operation of nerves and muscles, especially the heart. KIDNEY FUNCTIONS: (BUN, creatinine). These indicators are used to monitor kidney function. LIVER FUNCTIONS: (Total albumin, globulin). These tests can be used in detecting and/or monitoring liver function damage, tissue damage or inflammation. ALKALINE PHOSPHATE: (Uric acid, calcium, phosphorus). Used for detection and monitoring of bone, tissue and parathyroid disease, such as arthritis, gout, bursitis and lupus. GLUCOSE: This test is to measure blood sugar levels and is used to help diagnose/monitor diabetes mellitus. CHOLESTEROL: (Including HDL, LDL, VLDL, triglycerides and ratio of LDL/HDL). These are fats produced in the liver that combine with fatty oils in the blood stream. Cholesterol is further broken down and measured as HDL (good cholesterol) and LDL (bad cholesterol). The person who has higher levels of LDL is at greater risk of heart disease. Triglycerides determine the level of simple fats in the blood. CBC: (Complete blood count with differential). This is a series of tests of the blood that provides a tremendous amount of information about the hematologic system, immune response and many other organ systems. PROFILE #2 (PSA)—\$20.00 PSA—This test detects an enlarged prostate, infected prostate and/or prostatic cancer. It can be used to evaluate disease progression and to monitor treatment. PROFILE #3 (TSH)—\$15.00 TSH—This test is used to evaluate thyroid function and detect if there is too much or too little hormone secreted by the thyroid.
