County looks at interest

Treasurer hopes new account will make more

Hoping to make a little more interest on the county's idle money, Norton County commissioners asked Treasurer Cynthia Linner to move \$500,000 into a special account.

Mrs. Linner told the commissioners that the county has \$600,000 in a NOW checking account at the First Security Bank and Trust. The bank had sent the county information on a deposit system, which could allow the county to get more interest.

The Federal Deposit Insurance Commission (FDIC) insures the first \$100,000 for all depositors. After that the bank or financial institution has to provide security for any additional county money it has on deposit.

Under the Certificate of Deposit Accounts Registry Service, called CDARS, Mrs. Linner said, the bank does not have to have security for the county's money. Instead it disburses the money to several other banks or financial institutions so no one has more than \$100,000 of county money on

This can allow the bank to offer a high rate of interest, Mrs. Linner said, because it doesn't have to have security for the county money. It also allows the bank to use the security for loans in the community.

The commissioners said they liked the idea of getting a better interest rate on the county's money but wanted to know if the system is legal.

County Councilor Doug Sebelius said that he checked with the attorney general and the sys-

Mrs. Linner suggested putting \$500,000 of the money that the county has in it's NOW account at First Security in the new system for 28 days and see how it works.

"This would just be temporary," she said "Let's see what it does. When it matures in 28 days we'll see what we want to do."

 $The \, commissioners \, asked \, her \, if \,$ the county would have enough money to pay its bills and she assured them that there is plenty of money in the county's working checking account at First State

Mrs. Linner said the county gets most of its money in when real estate and property taxes are paid twice a year. For a while the county has a lot of cash but it will have to

last a long time. Normally, the county keeps accounts in several of the financial

institutions in the county, she said. Mrs. Linner said that on regular accounts the Bank is giving the county the best interest rate right

In other business, the commissioners:

• Heard from Sheriff Troy Thomson that the clerk of the court has collected \$1,318 in booking fees since the first of the year. The fee is \$45 per person, he said, but some people have to make pay-

• Visited with Dennis Schuck, who lives near Edmond in Graham County, about water which has been going over the road and backing up into his field.

County Road and Bridge Supervisor Tom Brannan agreed that there is a problem.

"This is not something that just appeared," Mr. Brannan said. "We've been trying to rectify it all summer."

• Received a letter of acceptance from the state for the bid for the bridge at Edmond from King Construction Co. of Hesston for \$353,168.


