- My tongue feels like there is hair on it.
My mouth feels funny.
There's a frog in my throat.
Something is stuck in my throat (but they're not choking).
My tongue feels heavy.
My ears feel like bugs are in them.
My lips feel tight.
My throat feels thick.
I feel a bump in the back of my throat.

Did you also know some non-food products may contain food ingredients that trigger allergic reactions? Personal care products such as shampoo, conditioner, lotion and sunscreen may contain milk, eggs, nuts, peanuts or other food allergens. Be sure to read the label.

Children suffer the most from food allergies. How they describe their reactions after eating a food they react to can help parents and doctors pinpoint the problem.

The Food Allergy and Anaphylaxis Network developed a list of words children may use to describe problems. Small children may put their hands in their mouth or pull and scratch their tongue. Their voice pitch may change and their speech may be slurred.

Here are examples of what children may say to describe problems:

- Food tastes spicy.
My tongue is hot (or burns).
Something is poking my tongue.
My tongue is tingling (or itches).

Negro league topic of lecture

Raymond Doswell, curator of the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum in Kansas City, will present a lecture at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, Sept. 13, in the Cultural Arts Center at Colby Community College.

Mr. Doswell will talk about the legendary black players and the all-black professional teams who were barred from organized baseball for the first half of the 20th century.

In 1945, Major League Baseball's Brooklyn Dodgers recruited Jackie Robinson from the Kansas City Monarchs. Robinson became the first African-American in the modern era to play on a Major League roster.

While this was a key moment in baseball and civil rights history, it prompted the decline of the Negro Leagues. The best black players were recruited for the Major Leagues and black fans followed.

The last Negro Leagues teams folded in the early 1960s but their legacy lives on through the surviving players and the museum.
