

# Logan holiday celebration draws crowd

The 29th annual Labor Day Celebration in Logan on Sunday brought in an estimated 2,000 people to attend the afternoon festivities, evening musical entertainment and fireworks display.

"I thought everything went great," said Lee Favre, director of the Dane G. Hansen Museum, sponsor of the event.

"The bands were very versatile and enjoyed by everybody. The cars seemed to have more people in them and lots of people sat out in front of their cars in the evening to enjoy the music and fireworks.

"Every year we have comments that this is the best fireworks display we've had and we heard these comments again. Rainbow Fireworks really puts on a good show. They added some extra colors this year."

The wind, as usual, was blowing pretty well during the day but calmed down in the evening so there was no problem with grass fires from the fireworks.

The Logan Fire Department and veteran Chief Lawrence "Sonny" Ruff were on hand just to be sure, however.

The Logan Chamber of Commerce operated the main food booth but there were plenty of others available so that event goes had plenty of choices.

Children had fun throughout the day going down the large Alligator Slide.

The Logan Lions Club directed traffic and the Phillips County Sheriff's Department was in charge of traffic control.
