Edna May Nelson, 95, Beaver City, Neb., died Thursday at the Beaver City Manor.

Mrs. Nelson was born Feb. 12, 1910, in Blue Hill Township, Minn., the daughter of Francis and Mary Louise (Thompson) Northway.

She graduated from North High School in Minneapolis, Minn. On Nov. 20, 1929, she and Clifford Reynold Nelson were married at her home in North Minneapolis. Following their marriage, she was a wife and homemaker for the family as her husband worked in bridge construction in Iowa, Wisconsin, Minnesota, North Dakota, Montana, Colorado, and Washington. They bought and operated a fishing resort near Frazee, Minn., from 1963 until 1971. They retired and moved to Texas where they lived until 1990, when they moved to Norton. They entered the Beaver City Manor in 2001, and Mr. Nelson died on Feb. 10, 2002.

She was a member of the First United Methodist Church and United Methodist Women in Norton. She enjoyed reading, crocheting, playing cards of all kinds, and corresponding with friends and relatives. She loved to take walks and she and her husband

enjoyed riding bicycles together when they lived in Texas.

She was preceded in death by her parents, her husband, son, Willis, and one infant son, two grandsons, two brothers, and two sisters.

Survivors include: three sons and their wives, Larry and Elaine Nelson, Albuquerque, N.M.; Jerry and Mavis Nelson, Detroit Lakes, Minn.; and John and Gloria Nelson, Plymouth, Minn.; three daughters, Sandra and Verlen Nickolauson, Detroit Lakes; Sonia Nelson, Johnston, Iowa; and Linda and Roger Ferguson, Cedarville, Ohio; one daughter-in-law, Lynn Nelson, Norton; 21 grandchildren; and 35 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at 4 p.m. Saturday at the church with Pastor Lew VanDerWege officiating. Inurnment will be held at Norton Cemetery.


