Schools need out-of-state student policy

change how it deals with students from out of state.

Superintendent Greg Mann said the state passed a law which puts limits on out-of-state students. He said the state won't pay for out-of-state students unless they meet one of three criteria:

 The student attended a Kansas school last year

• the parents or guardians pay taxes on real property in Kansas; or

• a parent or guardian works for the Kansas school district.

Mr. Mann said if none of these are met, the board can contact the student's home district and ask it to pay what Kansas pays per student.

He said if the home district refuses to pay, the Kansas district can still allow the student to attend, but the state won't provide any money for them, nor can it count them on its official head count.

He said there are two out-of-state students this year, but one meets the criteria and the other is 18 and has a Norton address.

However, he said the board needs to decide what to do for future students. The board has no policy now so it can allow
