The Northern Valley high school and junior high cross country teams competed in the Hill City Invitational on Sept. 22.

"This was the largest meet that we have attended this year," said Coach Bill Lowry. "The competition was very good and the course was more difficult as the north wind challenged the runners. The terrain provided a very difficult ditch to run though and several long gradual sloping hills.

"I felt that we took another step forward toward our goal of improving to regionals."

Out of 24 runners in the junior varsity girls run, Amanda Hopkins took first with a time of 15:47. Jesse Redeker was behind her in 8th place at 17:08, followed by Jena Jessup in 14th at 17:56.

"This was Amanda's third win in a row," said Coach Lowry. "She improved 1:40 from last week, moving from third early in the race to first by the mile mark. She

looked strong throughout the race. "Jesse ran a great race and improved:36 from last year. She ran strong at the end again and had a good finish. This was the second

fastest time of her career. "Jena ran an excellent race, dropping 1:27 from her time last year and 1:20 from last week. This was her strongest finish over the last 150 yards."

RESOLUTION REGULATING VEHICULAR TRAFFIC ON COUNTY ROAD "L" LYING BETWEEN COUNTY **ROAD W-6 AND THE CITY LIMITS OF** NORTON, KANSAS, WITHIN NORTON COUNTY, KANSAS, AND PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION

WHEREAS, Kansas law grants

WHEREAS, highway construction underway on U.S. Highway 36 within the County has caused the County of Norton, Kansas, to take steps to accommodate and regulate increased vehicular traffic on certain County roads lying between County Road W-6 and the City limits of Norton, Kansas.

BE IT RESOLVED, therefore, by the Board of County Commissioners of Norton County, Kansas, as follows:

SECTION ONE: That the County road made subject of this resolution is described as follows:

porate limits of the City of Norton,

SECTION TWO: That no person shall operate a vehicle on the County road described in Section One of this resolution at a speed in excess of 45 miles per hour.

SECTION THREE: That the full length of the County road described in Section One above in this resolution is designated as a "No Passing Zone." This section does not apply under the conditions described in Subsection (a)(2) of K.S.A. 8-1514, nor to the driver of a vehicle turning left into or from a private road or driveway.

SECTION FOUR: That enforcement of this resolution and punishments for its violation shall be governed by the Kansas Uniform Act regulating traffic, K.S.A. 8-1401, et seq.
