Candles may be beautiful, but too often they are the cause of deadly home fires.

Over the last decade, candle fires have tripled. In 2001 alone, an estimated 18,000 home fires started by candles were reported to fire departments, an all time high. These fires resulted in 190 deaths, 1,450 injuries and an estimated property loss of \$265 million. What's more, young school-age children are the most likely to be the victims of fires started by



Use Candles With Care— When you go out blow out

- Forty-one percent of U.S.home candle fires begin in the bedroom, causing 24% of the deaths resulting from these fires.
- Seven out of 10 households in the U.S.now use candles, with younger adults more likely to use them than older adults.

Used safely, candles can fill our homes with fragrance and create a calming and welcome mood. They add glow to the holidays and are an important part of religious observances. But what you may not realize is how easily a fire can start when

a candle is left unattended or left burning while someone sleeps. The most important thing to remember is that you can make sure candles are used safely in your home. If you use candles in your home, follow this safety advice: Place candles on stable furniture, in sturdy holders that will catch dripping wax; Never leave a candle unattended; If the power goes out, use flashlights for illumination, not candles; Keep candles away from all things that can catch fire; Place candles on higher furniture, where they won't be knocked over by children or pets; Never place lit candles in windows, where they could ignite blinds or curtains; Don't allow children or teens to have candles in their bedrooms.
