Apricot Salsa Chicken

1/2 cup flour I tsp. salt 1/4 tsp. pepper 1/4 tsp. paprika 6 boneless, skinless chicken breasts 3 T. oil I jar (16 oz.) salsa I jar (12 oz.) apricot preserves 1/2 cup apricot nectar Hot cooked rice In a shallow bowl, combine the first four ingredients. Add chicken, turn to coat. In a skil-

let, brown chicken in oil, drain. Stir in salsa, preserves and nectar; bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer, uncovered for 15 minutes or until sauce thickens and meat juices run clear. Serve over rice. Makes 6 servings.
