#### Furharvester class set for Saturday

A furharvesting education course will be held at the Kirwin National Wildlife Refuge office from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday.

The refuge office is four miles west of Kirwin or six miles east of Glade and one mile south.

The course will include classroom as well as hands-on outdoor activities and is a must for beginning trappers but any trapper can benefit.

Anyone born after July 1, 1966, must successfully completed an approved course like this to buy a furharvester license or to hunt, run or trap furbearers on land other than their own, or to sell pelts. Residents age 14 and 15 may purchase a "junior permit" for \$12.50.

## County says no to checkup

Kansas is offering a free audit for landfills but Norton County commissioners are uncertain if they want any more "help" from the state on the landfill that they have been trying to get open for more than two years.

Solid Waste Supervisor Curt Archibald told the commissioners about the state project to help counties with their landfills by having a person come out and look at them and give a report.

The findings, commissioners have been told, are just so they'll know what condi-

tion their landfill is in. The report will not be used against the county because a landfill doesn't meet certain standards.

"(It's) been made very clear that no repercussions will come out of this," Commissioner John Miller said. "Do we trust big brother, who says there are no repercussions?"

"What if six months later they come back and say all small arid landfills have these problems so we're going to close all of them," Mr. Miller said.

Commissioner Dean Kruse agreed with

## Blue Jay 'voice' honored at Friday's game

For 26 years, Norton's Larry Black was the "radio voice of the Blue Jays" sports teams, but he's been out of circulation for a year and was taken by surprise Friday when he received a gift from a stadium full of Norton fans.

Just prior to the kickoff of the Norton-Thomas More Prep football game, Larry was sitting with wife, Terri, in the stands when Bruce Poage, "voice of the Blue Jays announcer", directed everyone's attention to the track for a presentation.

Moments later, a stunned Mr. Black walked down the stadium steps to receive a Norton Blue Jay football helmet which had been signed by many, many Norton fans and former athletes. Making the presentation was Norton Community High School Athletic Director Larry Mills.

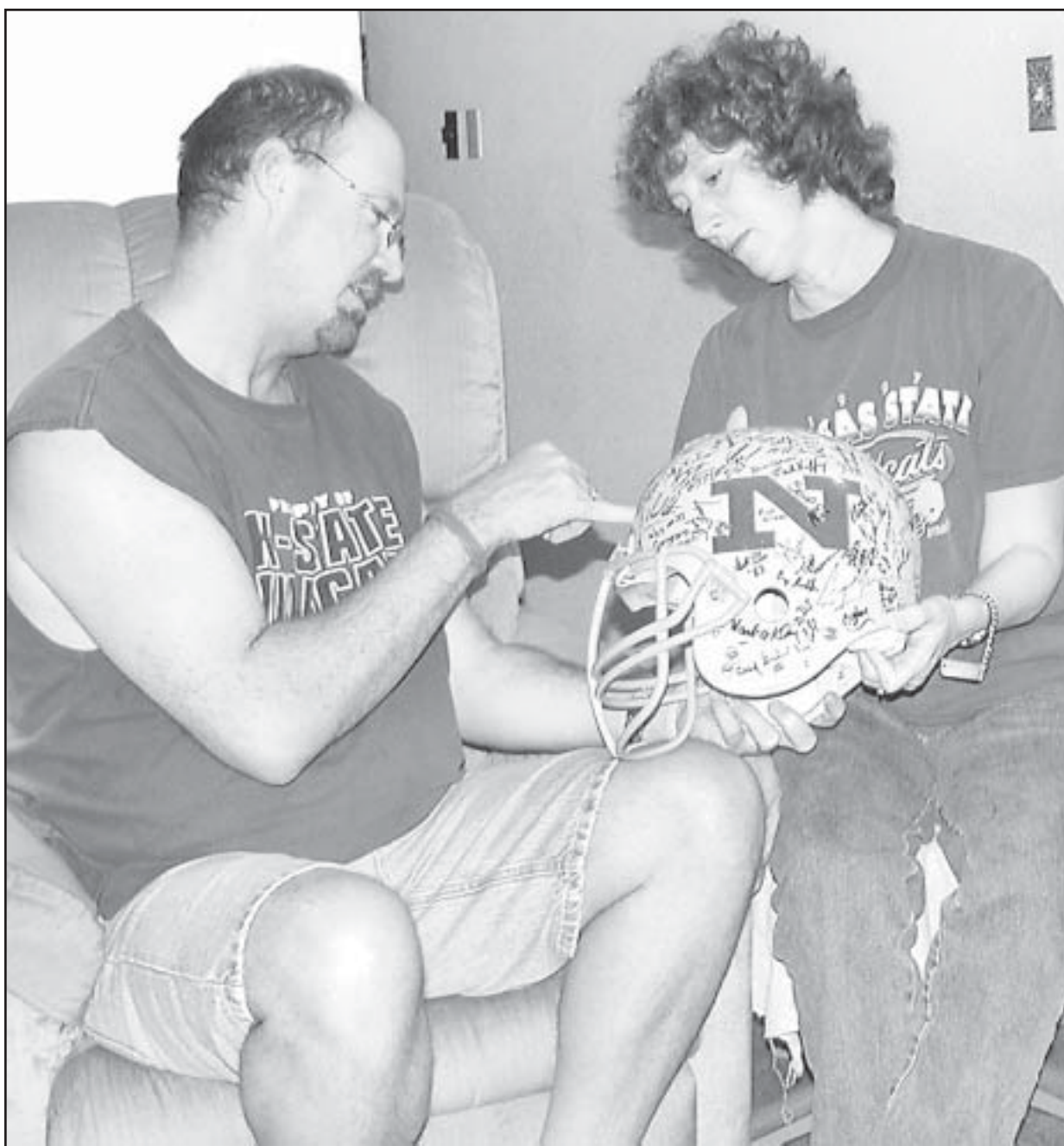
"During the 1979 football season, Larry Black began broadcasting Blue Jay football games and other sports competition for Norton's KQNK Radio," Mr. Poage said.

"He continued to broadcast games through the 2004 season. That is 26 years of telling us about hundreds of plays made by many memorable Blue Jay athletic teams. Over hundreds of miles through rain, sleet, ice and snow, Larry was there.

"Larry's knowledge of the game, his ability to make the game seem real, his instantaneous relaying of the action and his unbridled enthusiasm quickly earned him the title of 'radio voice of the Blue Jays'.

"Larry built a great following of local radio fans. The advent of the Internet quickly expanded this listening audience to a worldwide theatre as Blue Jay fans across

(Continued from Page 1) him, noting that the Norton County landfill has just been checked by the state and isn't even open yet. "We've gone through the most rigorous process. I don't see we need any more." Mr. Archibald said he didn't see how it could hurt to have another person check the landfill. Mr. Miller suggested he call other landfill operators in the area and see what they are doing.

"I don't see a lot of down side for us," Mr. Miller mused. "We're not open." "I do. I see nothing but down sides," Mr. Kruse said. County Councilor Doug Sebelius noted that many groups including Valley Hope have an outside committee come in to check their facilities before they get audited so they can find out the problems before they're inspected. "But," he said, "I'm not sure we would have any time to do what

this guy would suggest. I'd feel a lot better about it if we had the final OK. We might like to participate but we don't see any reason to at this time." Mr. Miller did say that he felt the landfill needs more windscreens to keep trash from blowing and suggested that Mr. Archibald talk to Road and Bridge Supervisor Tom Brannan about having his crew build some more this winter when there's less work to do on the roads.

# Local man charged with sexual battery

A Norton County farmer was arrested by the Norton County Sheriff's Department Thursday and charged with sexual assault for allegedly making unwanted advances against a 16-year-old boy. Jay Harold Holste faces two counts of sexual battery and one of lewd and lascivious behavior after the Norton boy accused him of "unlawfully and intentionally touching" the youth without his

consent with "the intent to arouse or satisfy the sexual desires of the offender" on July 19 and Aug. 5. Mr. Holste was also accused by the same boy of exposing himself on July 19. The two counts of sexual battery are class A person misdemeanors and the count of lewd and lascivious behavior is a class B non-person misdemeanor. Mr. Holste was booked into the

Norton County Jail. He posted a \$3,500 bond Thursday afternoon, of which he paid \$350 or 10 percent. He is to make his first appearance in the district court at the Norton County Courthouse at 1 p.m. on Wednesday, Oct. 26, before District Magistrate Judge Deb Anderson. Mr. Holste is married and has three daughters.

BACKGROUND OF THE CASE The Plaintiff, who is: a Kansas livestock owner, alleges that from January 1, 1985-December 31, 2002, Defendants violated the Kansas antitrust laws by conspiring or combining to fix the price and control the market for methionine. Methionine is an animal feed amino acid added to feed rations for poultry, dairy and beef cattle, turkeys and swine, and can be purchased either as pure methionine or incorporated into feed rations (hereinafter collectively referred to as "Methionine"). The Plaintiff alleges that as a result of the Defendants unlawful conduct, the price of Methionine was substantially higher than it would have been otherwise in a competitive market. Consequently, Class Members paid substantially higher prices for Methionine than they should have during the time period January 1, 1985 to the end of 2002. The Defendants deny these claims and charges.

Under the terms of the Settlement Agreement, certain Defendants have agreed to pay a total of \$75,000 to the Middleman Settlement Class into an interest-bearing account if and when the settlement becomes final. If the settlement is finally approved by the Court and becomes effective, certain of these funds will be used to pay Court-approved administrative expenses, litigation costs, including attorneys' fees up to 33% of the total settlement amount. The Named Plaintiff, Premier Pork, Inc. and its principal who testified in this case, which enabled the case to proceed on behalf of the class, will each request an incentive award of \$7,500. C. SETTLEMENT PROCEEDS DISTRIBUTION After payment of Court approved costs, fees, and incentive awards to the Named Plaintiff and its principal, the remainder of the Settlement proceeds for the two settlement classes will be distributed as follows:
