Director recognized for end-of-life care efforts

Sandy Kuhlman, executive director of Hospice Services in Phillipsburg, has received the Emily Taylor Champion for Living Initiatives For End-of-Life Care Award from the Kansas LIFE Project.

The award is the highest honor given by the project and is named after former Kansas University Dean of Women Emily Taylor. Dr. Taylor was recognized, posthumously, last year for her leadership and work in helping to create quality of life for the dying.

Ms. Kuhlman has worked more than 23 years to improve care for seriously ill Kansans. Her leadership has enabled Hospice Services to provide care in an area with a small population.

Project officials say that she has demonstrated on-going leadership and vision in her work with the Kansas Hospice and Palliative Care Organization, where she serves as chairwoman. She is ac-

tive with the National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization and has served on numerous task groups and committees, and works in issues related to rural access to quality care.

Ms. Kuhlman serves on the LIFE Project Board of Directors. She is a frequent speaker — locally, statewide and nationally.

The award was presented Thursday evening during a ceremony at the Wichita Marriott.
