# Women question utility charges

Two Norton residents think the city needs to change the way its utility fees are billed.

Brenda Wilson said she rents and had utility services transferred in her name on Oct. 24, but didn't move in until Nov. 2, and was assessed the minimum charge for

sewer, water and trash. The problem, she said, was the previous tenant was also billed for the same fees.

"I don't think it's legal to collect fees for the same services twice," she said.

Ms. Wilson said she thinks the city should pro-rate the fees when someone moves into a residence in the middle of a

billing cycle.

"I have no problem paying for services for 10 days even though I was only there for one day," she said. "But, I don't think I should have to pay the minimum service fees that have already been paid by another tenant."

"If it's a city ordinance, I recommend

that it be amended. I moved here from Arizona because it's a great place to raise my family. I checked into things before I moved here and understand the need to raise the utility rates. I don't have a problem with that — utilities are a third of the cost here from what they are in Arizona. (Continued on Page 5)

# Animal lover asks for help for shelter

It's the giving time of year and Michelle Armbrister hopes that people will remember their furred friends, in need of a home.

Last year she created Mittens For Kittens as a way to raise money and gather supplies for the Norton Animal Shelter. She also wants to raise awareness of the need for adoptive homes for cats and dogs at the shelter.

"I want to find as many good homes for these animals as possible. If I can save just one, it's worth it," she said.

Encouraged by the generosity of the Norton area, newly married Mrs. Armbrister decided to sponsor the event again.

"People in the community should realize there are abused, abandoned and neglected animals that need homes," she said.

Twice Sold Treasures and the Norton Animal Health Center are accepting gifts for the shelter. Needed are animal care products, food, toys and mats for them to

sleep on. Money is also appreciated.

Mrs. Armbrister, who already has two dogs and several cats, is looking for a home for Ernie, a hunting dog mix.

"He's good with kids, plays fetch and knows sit, lay down and come," she said.

Sherry Hickman, who runs the Norton Animal Shelter, said she has several dogs ranging in size from a Chihuahua mix to a couple of labs and cats in assorted colors and sizes.

She said the basic adoption fee from the animal shelter is \$40 for a dog and \$25 for a cat. Norton Animal Health Center is offering a special incentive to anyone who adopts an animal from the shelter.

If you bring the animal in for care during the first two weeks of ownership, the center will offer a discount on their services.

# State provides timely flu vaccine

If you haven't gotten a flu shot yet, now is the time to do so.

Gina Frack, director of the Norton County Health Department, said they received their final shipment of flu vaccine late Wednesday afternoon.

The health department received 500 doses with this shipment, she said.

"We ran out again before we got this delivery," she said. "But now we're fully stocked."

She said the vaccine will cost less than previous shots because they received it free of charge from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

That means, she said, the health department can't charge for the vaccine, but still needs to charge a \$10 administration fee.

Mrs. Frack said normally, the health department does several outside clinics in the fall, usually at the schools, senior centers and larger businesses. But, she said, since they got their shipment so late, they aren't going to do those clinics this year.

"We don't want people to wait, thinking that we will be coming to where they are," she said. "People need to come here (to the health department) for flu shots."

## Nurse worries about shots

Norton County Health Nurse Gina Frack told the county commissioners on Monday that she is locked into a contract with her flu vaccine supplier and will have to pay for the vaccine no matter when it arrives.

She said, as of Monday, she had only received one-third of the doses she has ordered. She said she's afraid that the rest of the medicine will come in the spring when no one will want the shots. The vaccine is only good for one sea-

son, she said, and while the spring is the worst time for the flu most people will have already gotten the shots or won't get them at all.

"You're hung," she said. "You don't have the vaccine on hand but you still have to buy it. What if you get your flu vaccine in March and nobody wants it?"

In the past, she said, she has run 25 to 30 vaccination clinics but this year because of the shortages she didn't feel (Continued on Page 3)

Mrs. Frack said that it's important to get a flu shot and that it's not too late.

"Getting the shot not only protects you from getting the virus or getting it as bad as you would without that protection," she said, "but it protects your family and anyone around you who may have problems with their immune system, such as cancer patients."

"It's still an appropriate time to get a

shot and it's definitely not too late. The flu season goes into May with the peak time being in February or March."

She said the shots were available to just about anybody.

"Anyone who is 6 months of age or older can get a flu shot," she said. "We're really trying to encourage the younger kids to get one, especially those who are (Continued on Page 5)

 "But, I don't think you should charge something just because you can."

Mayor David Corns said he recommended that she and Marlene Henderson, who was at the meeting for the same reason, attend the Utility Committee meeting at 5 p.m. on Monday in the city building. If they couldn't make it, he said it would be OK and that someone would let them know what recommendation the committee has for the council.

In other business, the council:  
 • Spoke with Larry Nelson, co-owner of New Age Industrial, about the possibility of adjusting the rates for large utility users.

City Administrator Rob Lawson said the city is waiting for Tony Turner with the Kansas Municipal Energy Association to do a rate study. Mr. Turner will charge a great deal less to do the study than other people. He said he scheduled the study over a year ago and, hopefully, Mr. Turner will be in Norton sometime in January.  
 "We're not putting you off," said Mayor Corns. "But, we have to wait for our figures before we can do anything."

Mr. Nelson said he just wanted things to be fair.

• Heard from Mayor Corns that in October sales tax collections were \$20,566.21 for the city and \$14,093.29 for the county for a total of \$34,659.50. He said the year-to-date total was \$314,988.42, which compared to last year's total at this time of \$313,029.20.

• Heard both Mayor Corns and Mr. Lawson thank the city, county and state employees for doing a great job with snow removal and everything else in the last two weeks.

"Everybody really pulled together and did a great job," Mr. Lawson said.  
 • Heard from Mayor Corns that, beginning in 2006, every purchase of a major unbudgeted item will go through the Finance Committee before going to the council. He said finance will decide if it is feasible and where the money will come from.

• Approved the 2006 calendar of events for the Norton County Horse Council.

• Appointed Wallace Burton to the vacant position on the Tourism Committee.

**Getting flu shot, washing best ways to stay healthy**

 in day care.  
 "The only people who we won't give a shot to are those younger than 6 months and those allergic to eggs. We produce the vaccine using eggs."

She said the vaccine takes about two weeks to work after the injection, and can last up to a year. She said the only side effect of the shot is a possible soreness at the site of the injection.

"It is a myth that the flu shot will give you the flu," Mrs. Frack said. "Nothing living is in the vaccine."

Some symptoms of the flu virus are fever, cough, sore throat, headache, chills, and muscle ache, she said.

Mrs. Frack said a good way to prevent getting the flu, aside from the shot, is good hand washing.

"Good hand washing is the best way, in addition to getting the shot, to prevent the flu," she said. "This is especially true after shopping where you handle money, touch doors, and come into contact with a lot of people. There are also the usual things as far as a healthy diet and plenty of rest."
