# Refund will go to employees

#### By VERONICA MONIER

School employees won't have any out-of-pocket expense for insurance for the rest of the fiscal

The Norton School Board decided Monday that that was what it was going to do with its share of a refund from Blue Cross Blue Shield.

Superintendent Greg Mann said the total refund was \$102,256, \$39,349 of which goes back to the group members as is set up in their contract. That leaves \$62,907 for the board to decide what to do with, he said.

The board, he said, had three options. It could:

• Retain 100 percent of its portion of the refund and put the money in a special fund, like capital outlay for later use;

• Retain part of its portion and then refund the rest to the employ-

• Refund 100 percent of the \$62,907 to the staff.

Employees could be last year's group members, this year's group members, all of this year's workers or all of last year's workers including full and part-time employees and supplemental workers like coaches and such.


Where do you stop, he asked. Do some employees get more of a refund or bonus than others because they paid more or work more or have bigger salaries, or does everybody get the same amount?

"There are a lot of layers to this problem," he said. "Nothing about this is going to be fair. Regardless of what you do, not everybody is going to be happy. There is no way it can be fair to everyone."

# Ambulance to get new equipment

The Norton County Emergency Medical Service will add blood pressure equipment to next year's budget.

Ambulance Director Andy Nielsen brought a broken blood pressure machine to the county commission meeting a week ago Monday. He said the machine came from the Lenora ambulance and was purchased in 1996.



## Taxes, vehicle tags due this month

The first half of 2005 taxes need by noon. to be paid in the Norton County Treasurer's Office by Tuesday, Dec. 20, if there is to be no penalty. Stubs from tax statements need to be either brought in or sent with payment to make sure the right account is credited.

Also, the deadline for those whose names begin with "U", "X", "Y" or "Z" is 11:30 a.m. Friday, Dec. 30. You must bring in or include proof of insurance for each vehicle, including the vehicle identification number, policy number and expiration date.

The treasurer's office will shut its computers down at 11:30 that Friday, so books can be balanced

The office will be closed Monday, Dec. 26, for the holidays. Regular business hours are 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Fri-
