Norton graduate coached champion state football team

Pat Haxton, a 1984 graduate of Norton Community High School, is the head coach of the Class 3A 2005 state champion Southeast of Saline High School football team.

After his team defeated Silver Lake for the state championship, Pat likened the experience to "reaching the top of the mountain" and said his players had worked extremely hard since last summer to reach their championship goal.

En route to the championship, they defeated Class 3A's top four teams, Phillipsburg, 26-13; Conway Springs, 32-0; Garden Plain, 26-22 and Silver Lake, 30-

Pat was also named "Coach of the Year" by the Salina Journal after this year's championship season and he has been chosen as an assistant coach in the 2006 Kansas

Shrine Bowl. Based on Pat's past achievements, it's a certainty that he also dedicated himself to the "climb up the mountain".

Pat grew up in Norton where his parents, Marceil and Dean Haxton, owned and operated a grocery store. He was a starting tackle on both sides of the ball his senior year when the Blue Jays, coached by Neil Melillo, were the first Norton team to ever qualify for the state championship game. They lost 13-6 to No.1 state ranked Fredonia in the Class 4A title game and ended

with a 10-3 record. His junior year, Norton lost to Wellington in the semi-finals following a controversial decision by the officiating crew. It was the Blue Jays' only loss as they finished 11-1.

Pat's senior year, he was honored by being chosen to the Salina Journal's Class 3AAll-Area Team as well as the *Topeka Capital* Journal's and Wichita Eagle's Class 3A First Team as an offensive lineman.

As a result of his prep prowess, Pat was recruited by Garden City Community College, where he played for two years. After his juco career, he was recruited by Peru State College, Peru, Neb. His senior year at Peru, he was named an NAIAAll-American and was first team All-Conference. The Peru team, coached by Tom Shea, compiled a 10-2 record in Pat's senior year and was ranked in the top ten nationally all season.

Pat is married to the former Melanie Guthrie of Norton. They have four children, Taylor, 14; Ryan, 11; twins Alex and Lexus,

"To this day, Norton is still considered to be home to Melanie and me," said Pat. "We still keep Norton in our thoughts all the time.

Pfannenstiel was a unanimous All-Mid-Continent League selection on defense this season and


