"I'm not sure I'll meet the criteria on the Day of Judg-

"I'm just not sure I'll measure up when I face God."

"I'm not sure I've done

enough to get in." **OUCH!** Those words of doubt and despair really hurt.

I hope they're not your words. Many of the world's religions make acceptance by its god the responsibility of the worshipper. If he or she works hard enough, is dedicated enough, does enough

good works, then maybe that person can achieve his or her reward. If, however, that person doesn't do enough good works, too bad! They'll have to try it all over again on a return trip through mortality or have to settle for something short of the ultimate reward. Goodness is something to be achieved, earned, and accomplished by hard work, dedication, and personal sacrifice. So get with it and hope your god likes what it sees.

At first glance, and to many popular observers of Christianity, the Christian faith isn't a lot different. This, however, is not the case at all.

Jesus tells us we can be born again, this time into God's family (John 3:3-7) . Once we're born of God, we are God's children and a glorious future awaits us (cf. 1 John 3:1-3). We're part of the Father's eternal family, adopted at the cost of Jesus' death on the Cross. We're not striving to get accepted by God; we're already accepted because of the price Jesus paid! We're not working to be righteous; God declares us righteous by the atoning work of his Son on the Cross and by the power of his incredible resurrection (2 Corinthians 5:17, 21; God's children and our desire to reflect his character and grace.

"Is there really that big a difference between the two concepts? It sounds so much the same, what does it really matter?" Yes! The difference is everything. It matters eternally. It is the difference between a suffocating and depressing driven faith, or a liberating and exhilarating empowered faith. Don't trust me, read Paul's letter to the Galatians!
