

School hunting for principal

High school lacking principal next year

The Norton School District is on the hunt for a new high school principal.

Superintendent Greg Mann said as of June 30, Principal Lary Stull is retiring. He has been the principal at Norton Community High School for 28 years and has worked for the district for a total of 32

He said he recommended that an interview committee be used to help choose the next principal and that the committee have two board members, two high school site council members, three staff members from the high school and himself.

Mr. Mann said they will be accepting applications until Tuesday, Feb. 28. A recommendation for hire should be made no later than the April board meeting, he said, but a special meeting might be used to hire the new principal.

As far as interviews go, he said, he would like to have those while school is in session if at all possible. The plan is to have the candidates meet the administration team, staff and Mr. Stull during the day and then be interviewed during the evening.
