She designed and created all the window treatments, herself. Bella Sole´ opened Jan.

Mrs. Snyder said Hawks Electrical did the wiring and installed the lighting fixtures; Kevin Lyons designed and built the reception area desk. He also designed the layout of the walls and rooms; and Kris Posson designed their sign, did the spa's lettering and the artwork on the window of one of the tanning rooms.


