

Norton business expands, puts several more people to work

A Norton manufacturer has expanded operations and increased the local workforce.

Gail Boller, president of Natoma Corporation, manufacturer of contract precision parts for the avionics, aerospace, medical and laboratory instrument industry, recently completed an expansion project at the plant on East Highway 36

Mr. Boller said a portion of the original building was remodeled to accommodate a separate room for new deburring equipment and another room for a plating system. The plating system room features two large, metal containers with chemical "baths" in three separate compartments. One process makes the aluminum parts corrosion resistant while another process cleans stainless steel. Plastic trays hold the parts while they are being cleaned to protect them from being damaged. Mr. Boller said the completion of the addition should add five to six more employees.

Water used in the cleaning process has

to be in a specific pH range. To meet that standard, Culligan Water of Oberlin installed a reverse osmosis and dionization system for the plant.

Mr. Boller said Natoma used to spend thousands of dollars every month sending plating work out for processing. "Now, it's mostly done in-house. And, that money will be going back into the local economy," he said.

Another addition to the line-up of machines at Natoma is a \$300,000 piece of equipment that combines three separate manufacturing operations into one process. The company is sending four employees for a week-long training on the new machine to the manufacturer's facilities in Elmira, N.Y.

Mr. Boller is optimistic about Norton's future and the future of Natoma Corp. He said the company has a low turnover rate and people in the area have a good work ethic. He added that all manufacturers in Norton are clean. That is, they don't use a huge amount of water and they don't put
