Coloring Easter eggs

The dining room table with all three leaves in it is covered with newspapers. On the well-protected table are mixing bowls of blown eggs. Also distributed around at intervals are all our teacups, custard cups, measuring cups, and cereal bowls. Each cup steams with a potion of vinegar, boiling water and various food colorings. Red and yellow onion peels are stacked in a basket and chunks of canning paraffin are laid ready in the center of the table. The air smells of beet pickle juice which is on the table in a gallon jar. We're having an Easter egg party

Early in the week our hand printed egg-shaped invitations had been sent. They instructed each guest to bring an old work shirt to serve as a smock and an empty Easter basket. Mama and her friend Mollie have been blowing out chicken eggs for weeks to provide plenty of "hen fruit" for this occasion. It was fun to watch them each morning as they carefully pricked the ends of each egg with a big darning needle and then blew in the small end until they were pink cheeked and the egg popped out the hole at the large end. Roger and Dad got rung in on the party prep, too, bending coat hanger wires into egg dippers with long handles for each bowl of color. They were paid with a lot of fried egg sandwiches and custard pies.

Shortly after lunch half a dozen of my first grade classmates trooped in, were buttoned into their smocks, and the fun began. First of all, each girl dropped a peeled, hard boiled egg into beet pickle juice and set that aside. Next procedure involved a large pan of hot, hard-boiled eggs that were carefully wrapped in the onion skins and set aside to cool and color while we worked at dyeing the hollow shells.

There were several containers of each color and soon lovely rose, blue, yellow and green eggs were being rolled in dye, lifted, inspected and rolled again, then laid out on lathe frameworks to drain and drip dry. Mama showed us how to write our names with the paraffin chunks on an egg before it was dipped in color and how it magically showed up white as the hue darkened. We drew stars and zig zag bands around some eggs, was the best party I ever had.

Later small amounts of each color were cautiously mixed to make blends. We learned quickly that red and green made ugly brown but that yellow mixed well with all the other colors. Blue and red made lovely lavender and deep purple; blue and yellow made many shades of green; blue and green gave us ocean colors. Yellow and red produced lots of shades of orange from peach to apricot to tangerine. Some of our hens laid brown eggs and those came out in unusual muted colors. We learned how to hold a pale dyed egg halfway down in a darker color to get half and halfsies. The room rapidly filled with giggles and squeals of delight as the table filled with our vivid handiwork. We unwrapped the cooled onion skin eggs and were amazed at the beautiful marbleized designs we had created. By late afternoon the dye bowls were empty and there wasn't a white egg left in the

Mama sent us off to wash our multicolored hands and strip off our stained smocks while she set out a big tray of fancy cucumber and egg salad tea sandwiches garnished with cheese-stuffed celery and carrot curls. Our pink beet pickle eggs were retrieved and eaten with great enthusiasm. To finish it off came a platter of pink, green and yellow frosted cupcakes topped with coconut nests full of jelly beans.

The girls departed toward evening, each bearing a brimming basket of decorated Easter eggs cushioned in green cellophane grass and a packet of marshmallow Peeps.

Yes, we were left with big mess to clean up but we laughed and sang "Here Comes Peter Cottontail" as we cleaned. We both cherished happy memories from that party and reminisced about it every year until Mama's last Easter on earth. Thank you, Mama — it
