With only two returning starters, and those starters being the only returning lettermen, the 2005-06 season for Coach Doug Reusink's Norton Community High School boys basketball team did not appear to be very promising but both the veterans and newcomers lived up to the Blue Jay winning tradition!

The Norton boys quintet compiled a 12-8 final season record, which compared very favorably with the previous year's 15-7 mark by a team led by all-league senior forward Ryan Maddy, who averaged 16 points and 7 rebounds per game and all-league senior guard Kyle Kats who was third high scorer and rebounder and led the team in steals and assists.

Last year's team placed second in the Topside Tipoff Tournament in Goodland, tied for second in the Mid-Continent League race and placed third in the MCL Tournament. Their final loss was 50-47 in the semi-finals of the substate tournament to eventual Class 3 A state champion Thomas More Prep of Hays.

Returning starters-lettermen for this season's Norton Blue Jay boys team were 6-foot-6-inch senior center Heath Vincent and 6' senior guard Nathan Morse. The only other senior was guard Dane Krizek who was injured and did not play.

Nic Lewis, 6'3" junior center; Brian Juenemann, 5'10' junior guard; Jared Engelbert, 5'11" junior guard; Logan Kats, 5'8" sophomore guard; Jared Cox, 6' sophomore guard-center and Wes Georgeson, 6'3" sophomore forward, saw a lot of playing time throughout the season.

Unfortunately, Engelbert suffered a broken arm in a game at Plainville on February 10 and was lost for the season. He was the most accurate Norton shooter from threepoint range and second most accurate free throw shooter.

The inexperienced Blue Jays got their initiation under fire in the season-opening Topside Tipoff Tournament in Goodland, where they placed sixth and emerged with a 1-

Norton outscored opponents this year by an average of 48.4 points per game to 35.2 points. The Lady Jays averaged 37.3 percent in field goal shooting as a team compared to 34.4 percent by opponents. They hit 51.2 percent from the free throw line while opponents hit 58.9 percent.

Norton averaged 25.6 rebounds per game compared to a 24.3 average by opponents. The Lady Jays' aggressive defense came up with 234 steals in their 20 games for an average of 11.7 thefts per contest. Opponents had only 99 steals for an average of 4.9 thefts. Norton's defense caused 419 opponent turnovers for an average of 20.9 per contest compared to iust 12.4 by the Lady Jays.
