

Norton BB Gunners on their way to internationals

The Norton County Rotary BB gun team, one of the most inexperienced in the many years of the Norton shooting education program, placed third in the 41st annual Kansas Jaycees State BB Gun Championships on Saturday in Manhat-

tan to earn a berth in the upcoming international shoot.

Norton has won the state shoot 36 times and the international shoot eight times, more than any other team in the world.

The top three teams from each state shoot qualify for competition in the Daisy/

Jaycees International BB Gun Championships. Manhattan Purple won this year's state championship with a shooting score of 1,851 and written test score of 484 for a total score of 2,335.

Manhattan's score would have tied for seventh place in last year's international shoot, which will be held again in Bowling Green, Kentucky. The international competition will be on June 20, July 1-2.

Placing second in the state shoot on Saturday was the Arkansas City No.1 team with a shooting score of 1,820, test score of 484 and total score of 2,304.

The Norton Yellow team was third with a shooting score of 1,767, test score of 480 and total score of 2,247.

Miami County was fourth with a shooting score of 1,712, test score of 454 and total score of 2,166. In fifth place was Arkansas City No.2 with a 1,696 shooting score, 452 test score and 2,148 point total.

The Norton Blue team was just three points out of sixth with a shooting score of 1,652, test score of 464 and total score of 2,116. Jefferson County and Wyandotte County both scored a 428 on the written test but Jefferson County outshot

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
