Loans are available for farmers, ranchers

The United States Department of Agriculture can make loans to farmers and ranchers to build or upgrade farm storage and handling facilities under the Commodity Credit Corporation Charter Act, according to information from the Norton County Farm Service Agency office.

The loans have a seven-year term with annual principal payments plus interest amortized over the term of the loan. The maximum principal loan amount is 85 percent of the net cost not to exceed \$100,000. the Farm Service Agency maintains a first lien on the facility and a first lien is required on the real estate where the structure is located for all loans over \$50,000.

Producers interested are encouraged to stop by the Norton Farm Service Agency office.
