'County residents have to be aware it's coming," she said. "Advertising for three weeks in advance can make a 33 percent difference in the number of people who respond."

She said they could advertise it on the Nex-Tech television page for \$12 a week and could also put it in the paper and on the radio.

Board member Gayle James asked if there was any reason she couldn't keep a stack in her office "When people come in to pay

their city bill, I can ask if they've filled out their survey yet," she said. "That's how we got most of the surveys filled out that were August would probably be the best needed for the grant for the new community building."
