

Development board looks at potential survey

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"County residents have to be aware it's coming," she said. "Advertising for three weeks in advance can make a 33 percent difference in the number of people who respond."

She said they could advertise it on the Nex-Tech television page for \$12 a week and could also put it in the paper and on the radio.

Board member Gayle James asked if there was any reason she couldn't keep a stack in her office in Lenora.

"When people come in to pay their city bill, I can ask if they've filled out their survey yet," she said. "That's how we got most of the surveys filled out that were needed for the grant for the new community building."

Ms. Monier said when you do something like this, you use several different avenues, that being a good one.

She said she has several more ideas on that as well. She proposed that a set be taken to the senior center, business owners, people active in the community and also to the high school, that way several groups could be compared to the general population's opinion. Each would be kept separate, she said.

Mr. Miller suggested they be done on different colors of paper,

so they would know which survey came from where.

Ms. Monier said that was a good idea, since you have to code them in some way.

Mr. Miller asked how soon it needed to be sent out and Mr. Eveleigh asked what exactly was wanted from the board.

Ms. Monier said she wanted the board to look at the survey she gave them. Then at the next meeting, they could tell her any comments or corrections that they think need to be made. She has to send it to an internal review board at K-State as well.

"We can't get the students until September," she said. "The end of August would probably be the best time to send it out to county residents. That way, you don't miss anyone on vacation. We'll know by October if you're getting them back."

Mr. Miller said the board's cost would be mailing, advertising, paper and envelopes.

Ms. Monier said that was correct. She said the board's mission statement would be on it, as well as a brief explanation as to what it is for and why they were doing it.

The board said they would review it and get back to her at the next meeting, which will be at 5:30 p.m. on Tuesday, May 9.
