Carrol A. Bryant, 82, formerly of Norton, died Monday at his home in St. Helens, Ore.

Mr. Bryant was born Aug. 20, 1923, in Norton County to Clarence and Zoie (Cochran) Bryant.

He attended school in Norton. On Oct. 4, 1941, he married Georgie Donnelly in Oberlin.

He served with the U.S. Army from 1944 to 1946, during World War II in the South Pacific.

He was a member of the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars in Norton and Wood-

land. He enjoyed gardening, collecting and was considered a jack-of-all-trades.

Preceding him in death were his sister, Berniece Sweeley and two infant daughters.

Survivors include his wife, Georgie Bryant, St. Helens; two sons, Donald Bryant, Klamath Falls and Carrol Bryant, Jr., Elverta, Calif.; two daughters, Gloria Aldinger, Klamath Falls and Diana McLaughlin, St. Helens; a brother, Elton and Beth Bryant, Norton; 10 grandchildren; and 20 great-grandchildren.

His body was cremated and a Celebration of Life service will be held at 2 p.m. tomorrow at Sunset Park Community Church, St. Helens.

Club studies the causes of heart attacks and strokes

North Dividers Family and Community Education Unit met April 21 at the Town and Country Kitchen.

Ella Mae Schulze and Nora Washburn were hostesses. Twelve members answered roll call with "An Easter Tradition".

It was learned that four members plan to attend District Recognition Day at Quinter on Monday. Ruth Lofgreen gave the lesson, "Preventing Death and Disability From Heart Attack and Stroke".

Mrs. Lofgreen told members cardiovascular disease is one of the most serious health threats.

Two forms of the disease are coronary heart disease and stroke. One cause of heart attack and stroke is an accumulation of a fatty substance called plaque in the walls of arteries.

Almost 25 percent of all adults smoke, with more men smoking than women. Smokers are two to four times more likely to suffer

heart attack than non-smokers. One in five Americans have high blood cholesterol. The higher the cholesterol level, the greater the build-up of plaque.

Key ways to control heart attack and stroke are: •lower blood pressure •get more physical activity •maintain or lose weight •eat a diet rich in fruits and vegetables; low in fat, saturated fats and cholesterol •choose lean meat, fish and skinless poultry, •limit alcohol consumption to one per day for women and two per day for men •maintain a healthy weight •engage in 30 minutes of moderate physical activity five or more times per week.

Risk factors for heart disease and stroke goes up as one ages. Other factors include gender, family history, race and ethnicity.
