



Safety gets early start

Program teaches kids about do's and don'ts of bicycling

Kindergarten, first and second grade students learned a little more about bicycle safety this week during several bicycle rodeos.

This year, said Officer Toby Kuhn, a board member of the Chaston VanDerVeen Memorial Bicycle Safety Program, they gave helmets to all of the kindergartners and any first or second grader who had outgrown their

He said 58 helmets were given away in Norton and another 22 were given out at Northern Valley.

After the students got tips from local law enforcement, they got to put on their new helmets and ride their bikes in different activities designed to reinforce what they just learned about safety. All of the students were able to participate as spare bikes were brought to ride. In between the activities, students ate a few cookies and drank some

"I think it was outstanding," said Officer Kuhn. "The response was excellent from both schools, teachers and

Local law enforcement and members of the safety program board went to Northern Valley Wednesday and then to Eisenhower Elementary Thursday. They went back to Eisenhower today to catch the kids they missed.

In Norton, Jay VanDerVeen, Chaston's grandfather, started the program by reminding the kids why they were there and how important it was to wear a helmet.

"It's the reason you're here," he said. "Chaston was hit by a semi. He wasn't wearing a helmet and he went through a stop sign.

'We're going to teach you kids the law so it doesn't happen to you. Wear your helmet at all times and always obey the traffic laws.' Officer Asa Stiles talked about bicycle accidents and

how many of them result in serious injury because the rider wasn't wearing a helmet. "Wearing a helmet will cut your chance of getting se-

riously hurt," he said.

Wearing a helmet is the number one rule in riding a bicycle, he said.
