

Kit designed to provide kids' data

By VERONICA MONIER It's better to be safe than sorry. But when being safe no longer works, it's

better to be prepared. The Norton County Sheriff's Department is helping parents to do just that by getting a sample of their children's DNA, just in case something goes wrong.

To do so, Sheriff Troy Thomson and Deputy Scott Bohl were at Pamida on Saturday giving parents ID kits.

Sheriff Thomson said a little over 100 parents, some with their children and some without, stopped by to pick up a kit.

For those parents who had their children with them, Sheriff Thomson or Deputy Bohl would get their DNA sample by swabbing the inside of each child's cheek, and then mixing it with a chemical to preserve it. It was just as easy for those parents whose children weren't with them, as the kit makes it easy for the parent to do it themselves.

Along with the DNA sample, he said the kit contains a fingerprint card, dental (Continued on Page 5)

The Norton County Economic Development Board is going to help a Norton woman do a survey of the county.

Janis Monier, doctoral candidate with Kansas State University, said she talked to her professors and they felt the best way to send the survey out was by inserting it in the paper.

She said the surveys need to stand out. "It has to be something that catches the eye, so people don't throw them away," she said.

Vice-chairman Curtis Eveleigh suggested putting something like "Help Norton County" at the top.

Ms. Monier said that is exactly what they needed to do.

She said as far as costs went, she estimated paper would be about \$107, envelopes would be about \$280, inserting it would be about \$187, and return postage would be about \$1,044, making an estimated total of about \$1,618. This, she said, didn't include copying or advertis-
