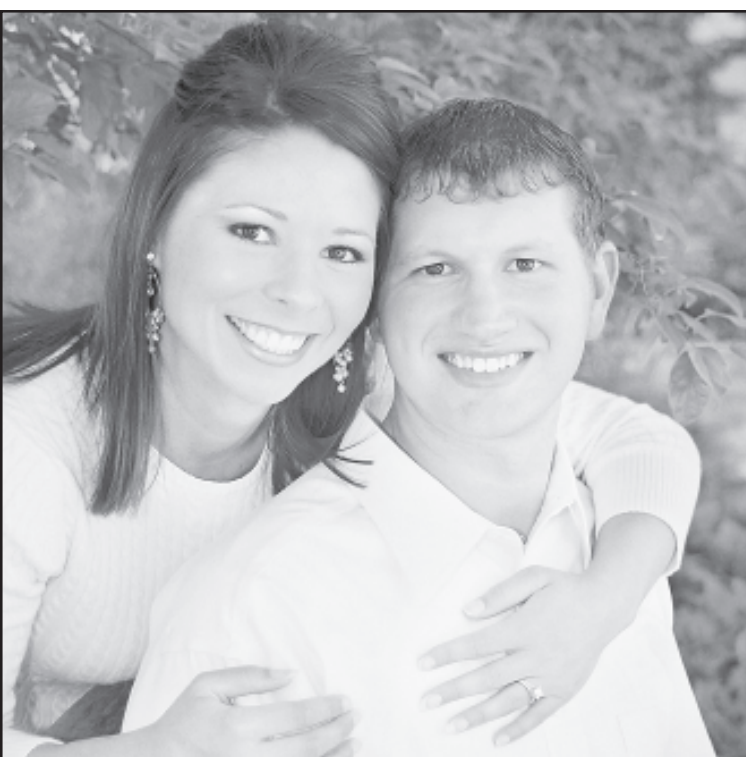
The couple will be married Saturday in Manhattan.
