

Woman wants more input on tree decision

A Norton resident wants more input from the community before a decision on the trees downtown is made.

Harriett Gill told the Norton City Council at Wednesday's meeting that she had written a letter to the editor to *The Norton Telegram* about the trees downtown and it was printed Tuesday. She said she was at the meeting to she if anyone on the council had any questions and to make her concerns known.

"I know the trees downtown (at the intersection of State and Main streets) are messy," she said. "But, they're beautiful.

"A lot of work has been put into the trees by a lot of volunteers over the years. They're 18 years old and shouldn't be cut

"If they need to be trimmed, then lets trim them."

Councilman Ron Briery said people are until a decision was made. constantly having to clean up tree debris

and bird droppings from the tree by Moffet Drug. The tree also makes it hard to clean off the ice and snow, making it

"like a ice skating rink" in the winter. "I'm not against trees," he said. "If we council has any problem buying new trees and planting them somewhere else."

Mr. Briery said when the trees were planted, no one expected them to get as big as they did. They're starting to push up the sidewalk and obstruct the view of

"I think you need more input from the community before you do anything," Ms. Gill said. "More members of the community were involved with these trees than just the people on the plaques. People in town should have a say in whether or not

The council said it would be a while

to cut them down."
