# U.S. Congressman fights for money to combat methamphetamines

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congressman Jerry Moran announced success in restoring funding to the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grants Program that provides Kansas drug and law enforcement officers with the resources and technologies needed to combat methamphetamine production, trafficking and use. Funding for this program has been significantly reduced in recent years and is falling short of what is needed by state and local drug and law enforcement officers.

"In many rural areas like Kansas, meth has become the leading drug problem and the addiction is spreading," Congressman Moran said during House debate.
