Disaster loan deadline Sept. 26

The expiration date for filing applications for Emergency Disaster loans by farmers and ranchers in Norton, Rawlins, Decatur and Phillips counties is Sept. 26, said John C. Vogt, farm loan manager, Farm Service Agency, Norton.

Mr. Vogt said those needing farm credit as a result of severe winter storms Nov. 27-28, 2005 and who think they are eligible for Farm Service Agency assistance, should make their applications at the FSA County office, 11640 Pineview Dr., or PO Box 365, Norton, Kan. 67654 before the expiration date.

"Loans covering physical and/or production losses may be made at 3.75 percent interest rate, and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible, consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability to pay," he said.
