Mrs. Applegate said the general consensus was the turnout was better than what had been anticipated. In fact, most vendors were very pleased and want to have the Treasure Hunt again.

She said people from 12 states registered at her booth. She said, "Granted, most of them were from Kansas and Nebraska, but that still leaves 10 other states."

Cindy McMullen, owner of Town and Country Kitchen said, "It was great. We were busy all

weekend. I saw all kinds of people (in the restaurant) I hadn't seen before. We want to do it again — soon."

Mrs. Applegate said the spirit of cooperation between the different Chambers of Commerce along the highway is what really made the event successful. All the offices coordinated with each other and distributed maps. She said one county along the route had 70 booths.

She said, "That's what it's all about — keeping the money flowing from one county to another."

Advertising for the event brought visitors from long distances. Mrs. Applegate said she talked to a woman from Colorado who picked up a brochure in Pella, Iowa and a couple who got their brochure at the Wichita Antique Festival. A couple, formerly from Atwood, now living in Tennessee, read about it in *The Rawlins County Square Deal*. Another couple from Kansas City, Mo., met friends from Trinidad, Colo., in Saint Francis. Both couples were towing empty trailers with plans to drive the entire length. She

said Sunday she saw the yellow Hummer driven by the Colorado couple going back west with their trailer full.

Mrs. Applegate said the event is tentatively planned for the same time next year, the third weekend of September with the same 13 counties.

She said water tower park will once again be reserved for non-profit organizations.

She said the event was also a good way to remind people that US 36 is a good highway to drive. Maybe they'll come back.

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that Norton could play.

Mr. Mills said the problem is that most of the schools playing baseball have scheduled two years out and there is a limited number of games they can play, so they would have to bump another team to get Norton in.

"It will be difficult getting teams to play," he said.

Board member Jennifer Terrell said if they looked at baseball, then they would have to look at adding softball as well.

Mr. Mills said the issue of finding games will be the same with softball.

Superintendent Greg Mann said he and the administration team are still not in favor of adding baseball.

"We're not just talking about

one activity," he said. "We're talking about three or four. The only thing that has changed is the cost of the field. But, it won't be \$1 forever."

And, he said, having a survey would probably make the board beholden to do something. He said he didn't know how Mr. Mills and his assistant, Dorla Jones, would be able to handle another activity.

Plus, he said, you get into the problem of whether or not to allow students in track to participate in baseball. If so, some students will be missing three or four days of school a week because of activities.

"I just want to caution you," he said.

Board member Elaine Lofgreen said she was still against it and when people heard it would be

brought up, asked her to vote against it.

"I think it would be irresponsible to do a survey now," said board member Jeff Nielsen. "We're not doing this because it's not good business. You might as well ask (the students) if they want more pizza, or hockey. They may want it, but at the same time may not be able to participate."

A motion was made to allow Joe Durham to implement an administrative approved survey to ascertain the interest in baseball for 2007-08.

The motion failed 2-5. Board member Craig Renner and Mr. Ellis voted yes, while board member Mark Keilig, Mrs. Terrell, Mr. Nielsen and Mrs. Lofgreen voted no. Board member Chris Harting abstained.

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
