



Newspaper owner elected to national office

Steve Haynes, president of Nor'West dent this year. Newspapers and co-owner of *The Norton*

Telegram, was elected vice president of the National Newspaper Association at

the group's annual meeting

in Oklahoma City. Mr. Haynes, who has served as treasurer for the past year and as a district director for five, will be president of the group in 2007-'08. Jerry Tidwell of Granbury, Texas, is presi-

The association, with nearly 3,000 member papers, is the largest newspaper group in the nation. It serves community newspapers, mostly weeklies and smaller dailies in rural America, but members range in size from the *Bird* City Times in Kansas to The Washington Post.

"NNA represents community newspapers on the national stage," Mr Haynes

said. "We focus on federal legislation affecting newspapers, on postal issues and on First Amendment and open government freedoms, which are important to all Americans."

The group has offices in Columbia, at the University of Missouri, and in suburban Washington.

"It's a great honor to be chosen to represent fellow publishers across the country," said Mr. Haynes. "It's already been a great opportunity for Cynthia and me to meet people and see places we'd other-
