If residents take items to the landfill themselves, normal county fees will apply

City Trucks will make special trash pickup during these days. All items MUST be out at the curb by 8 a.m. on your regular route day.

Monday, Tuesday & Wednesday, November 6, 7, and 8
NO ITEMS WILL BE PICKED UP IN THE ALLEY!

All types of trash will be picked up on your regular trash route day EXCEPT yard waste, tires, and household hazardous waste. Yard waste will be picked up on your regular yard waste route day. There will be a \$10.00 charge per item for appliances with Freon. Tree limbs must be cut no longer than 8 feet long. Yard waste must be in a solid container. Fireplace ash must be in plastic bags.

The maximum limit of items the City will pick up at each residence is one load of tree limbs and one load of metal and construction debris. Normal household trash will be picked up in the usual manner.

SPECIAL NOTE: TRASH MUST BE SEPARATED, i.e., tree limbs from metals, etc. because they are disposed of in different locations at the landfill. Mattresses and furniture need to be separate from other trash. Hazardous waste such as paint, motor oil, batteries, pesticides, poisons, caustic chemicals, etc. WILL NOT be picked up and should be taken by owners directly to the county landfill.



REMNINDER: Once-a-week pickup begins the week of November 20. Only regular household trash and recyclables will be picked up on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of each week.

City of Norton Snow Ordinances

The City of Norton wants to remind the public of our three snow ordinances. One requires the removal of snow and ice off public sidewalks within 24 hours after the fall of the snow or sleet. The second ordinance relates to removing parked vehicles from emergency snow routes. When the City of Norton publicly announces through the news media that an emergency snow condition exists, it is a violation to have any vehicle or trailer parked on a designated emergency snow route. The third ordinance makes it a violation for any person to pile or dump snow on any cleared street from a private driveway or sidewalk so as to constitute an impediment or hazard to normal traffic on the street. The city of Norton thanks everyone for their efforts in complying with these ordinances.
