Furthermore, this program is designed to open doors into careers within Norton County that may not have been available or well-known by the students prior to the program's inception.

The long term goal of this program is to train and retain wellqualified employees from within Norton County and to help sustain a viable workforce for all existing and new employers looking to locate in Norton County. We should provide them with as many opportunities for success within and outside the county whether through OJT programs, college, or the highest quality employment available. We are an aging community, seven years above average for the state of Kansas and the U.S. as a whole (2000 U.S. census). Therefore, our children are the future of Norton County. Requirements:

Second semester senior students at Northern Valley High School who have a 2.0 or better Grade Point Average and attend regularly may in some cases be released early from school to work. This program will entail school attendance in some part of a day and work part of a day.

To request this program, the following criterion are established:

The pupil's parents must request, in writing, to the school counselor, their desire to have their student participate in an early release-to-work program.

The student will submit an approved form requesting early work release from school to work.

The school counselor and principal will review the student's needs, academic records and other necessary criteria. The principal will make a recommendation to the Board of Education.

The student must maintain employment until 3:30 p.m. every school day. Additional time must be worked out between the employer and employee. The employer will be responsible for contacting the school if the job status changes.

If the job status changes, the student must work with the school to find a new job. Any student who does not work with the school to maintain employment will forfeit their right to participate in graduation ceremonies.
