Members of the Norton City-County Airport Board conducted their business in record-breaking time Monday night.

The only business at hand was the report by airport manager, Delvis Miller. He said the application to renew the radio license for the non-directional beacon (NDB) and the automated weather observation system (AWOS) missed the deadline. He said the application by Jerry Miller, maintenance person for the equipment, would have to go through the process again. The radio license has to be renewed every seven years.

In other business the board:
