Grants are being made available under the federal Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU). In addition, KDOT is accepting requests for state funding made available under the Comprehensive Transportation Program (CTP) for rural transportation providers.
