

City taking over damaged property

The Norton City Council has agreed to take over the downtown property that was destroyed by fire earlier this year.

At last week's council meeting, City Attorney Karen Griffiths said Lee and Sioban Hanes, the property owners, had signed the agreement giving the city the property if the city would clean up the

She said the paper work was at the title office and was expected to be finished on Monday. Once that is finished, she said the city can begin the project.

City Administrator Rob Lawson said he spoke with the Norton County Commissioners, who have offered the city whatever help was needed with the clean-up, including providing a lot of heavy equip-

He said the landfill will take the material that has been separated free of charge. But, Mr. Lawson said, there will still be a lot of debris that they won't be able to

Also, he said, the city is planning to put a locked, chain link fence around the property so that people don't go in at night when crews aren't working.
