Blue Jay boys settle for 2nd

For almost 29 minutes, the Norton Community High School boys basketball team battled the Smith Center quintet on even terms, but the final three minutes belonged to the Redmen as they defeated the Blue Jays 57-41 to win the championship of the Mid-Continent League Tournament on Monday evening in Gross Memorial Coliseum in Hays.

The two teams traded the lead throughout the game and, with 3:36 remaining in the fourth quarter, the Blue Jays were on top 39-38. But, Smith Center went on an 11-0 run in less than two minutes to move on top 49-39. The Redmen got their points on two quick baskets inside on turnaround shots by Braden Wilson, a three-point basket by Joe Windscheffel, two free throws by Jared Mocaby and two more charities by Windscheffel.

The Blue Jays got their final basket of the game when point guard Logan Kats fed post Wes Georgeson inside with 1:47 left to make it a 49-41 contest. After that, the Redmen paraded to the free throw line, sinking 8 of 8 to extend the final margin to 16 points.

Smith Center held a slim 11-8 lead after one quarter. Both teams tallied 11 points in the second quarter which ended with Norton trailing 22-19. The Blue Jays' best quarter was the third when Jared Engelbert hit two baskets from beyond the arc and reserve post Preston Herman swished three baskets and Norton outscored Smith Center 14-12 to make it a 34-33 ballgame.

In the fourth quarter, Smith Center hit 14 of 15 free throws in outscoring the Blue Jays 23-8.

"We let it get away from us," said Norton head coach Doug Reusink. "We competed for three quarters. We weren't mentally tough enough down the stretch. We panicked and did some silly things instead of staying with what we can do.

"I'm proud of our players but we lack confidence at times. We just have to learn from this and bounce
