Ambulance Director Ruth Schillig said the \$1,000 covers more than just the building grant. She said they will also work on getting the service grants for equipment and training.

After more discussion, the commission decided to hire Blue Sky Ink for the emergency medical service. County Counselor Doug Sebelius will review the contract and give it to Mr. Miller to sign.
