

School out early for wrestling

Norton junior and senior high school students will be dismissed from school early on Friday.

The Norton Community High School is the 2007 host of the 3-2-1A Western Regional Wrestling Tournament, which is, other than the state tournaments, the most competitive and best attended wrestling tournament in the state.

Students will be dismissed at 11:30 a.m. on Friday. Breakfast will be served, but not lunch.

Buses will run at the normal school dismissal time of 3:30 p.m. Bus students in seventh through twelfth grade who need to ride the bus home will need to be at the junior/senior high bus pick-up location no later than 3:35 p.m.

On Friday, wrestling will begin at 2 p.m.with the championship quarter-finals around 5 p.m. The first round consolation matches will begin at 6:30 p.m.

On Saturday, the championship semi-finals will start at 11 a.m., followed by the consolation quarter-finals around 1 p.m., consolation semi-finals around 3 p.m.,

County helping fire district to get grant

The Norton County Commission is doing what it can to help the rural fire district get a new truck.

Commissioner John Miller said the district found a used truck in Ohio that was in good condition for \$30,000 and wanted to know about the possibility of the county buying it and giving it to the rural fire district, since the county needed it for fire

"With the increase in housing and businesses in the county, we don't really have an adequate fire truck for fire protection," he said.

Phillip Loughry, chairman of Rural Fire District No. 2, agreed, saying the district didn't have a truck that covers its needs. And, he said, in order for property owners to receive an insurance discount, the district needed to have a 1,000 gallons per ment, the district's pump only pumps 300 after May.

gallons per minute.

County Counselor Doug Sebelius, after consulting with statute books, said it wasn't really legal for the county to buy a fire truck and then give it to the district.

Mr. Loughry said he talked to Blue Sky Ink, a grant writing company, who said they would be happy to try and get grants for the fire department. He said Blue Sky Ink told him that the chances of them getting a grant for a new truck were very good because a huge need was there.

He said the people giving the grant would know who they were giving it to by mid-April and then those receiving the grant would find out a couple of months later. After that, it takes a year to build a

But, he said, if they buy a used truck, it diminished their chances for getting a grant. Blue Sky Ink, he said, recomminute pump on their truck. At the mo- mended that they not buy anything until Rural Fire District No. 2 to write a grant

Commissioner Leroy Lang said it would be legal to pay the \$1,000 fee to Blue Sky Ink.

Mr. Loughry said the match money needed for a grant would be pretty low, and that the district could afford that. After talking to Blue Sky Ink, the Rural Fire board, he said, thinks that they should give it one more shot and try to get a grant for a new truck.

"Now that we have a building we could put it in, we're in better shape," he said. "Before, that was half the problem. The trucks we have now had problems fitting into our old building.

"A new truck would be good for the entire area, not just the district. We could help out other fire departments more with a new truck.'

The commission decided to obtain the services of Blue Sky Ink on behalf of (Continued on Page 5)
