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# Peanut butter gets sticky with recall

The FDA has issued a nationwide recall on two brands of peanut butter, Peter Pan and Great Value. The code number to look for on the lid starts with "2111".

A peanut butter recall in the news affects a relatively small portion of the nation's peanut butter supply, and doesn't mean that consumers should stop buying or using other peanut butter.

It does mean that consumers should check the brand and product code of peanut butter they have on hand and, if it matches the recall, discard the potentially contaminated product.

If consumers have any of this Peter Pan or Great Value brand peanut butter in their home that has been purchased since May

2006, thy should discard it, but they should save the product lid For a full refund, consumers must return the Peter Pan Peanut Butter or Great Value Peanut Butter product lid along with their name and mailing address to: ConAgra Foods, P.O. Box 3768, Omaha, Neb. 68103. You should be able to return it to the store you bought it from and get a refund.

The potential contaminant, Salmonella Tennessee, can cause food borne illness, which include fever, diarrhea and abdominal cramps, and typically appear within 12 to 72 hours after ingestion. The illness usually lasts four to seven days and most people recover without treatment.

Those with severe diarrhea, however, may need to be hospitalized. Salmonella can be particularly danger-

ous for children, whose immune systems are not yet fully developed, older adults whose immune systems are weakened by age and others who may be suffering from chronic illness or undergoing medical treatment such as chemotherapy that has weakened their immune system.

### State park fees half the price of last year

The price of state park permits has gone down and there is still time to get off-season passes for off-season

The 2006 Kansas Legislature decided to give state parks more money in 2007 and so the parks were able to offer a reduction in the cost of permits this year.

In previous years, as the Legislature gave the state parks less money, the Department of Wildlife and Parks had to make up for the lost money by increasing the cost to get in. But because the state parks received more money this year, they were able to cut costs down by al-

In the 2007 off-season, which is Oct. 1 through March 31, park prices

- Daily Vehicle Permit \$3.70; Kansas senior/disabled, \$2.60;
- Annual Vehicle Permit \$19.35; Kansas senior/disabled,
- Additional Annual Vehicle Permit — \$11.85; Kansas senior/disabled, \$7.

For the peak season, which runs April 1 through Sept. 30, park prices (Continued on Page 3)
