

Norton council helps children with special week

The Norton City Council is helping as it can with the Week of the Young Child.

Holly Puga, a local daycare provider, told the council at its last meeting that this year, the Week of the Young Child is being held at the end of April. She said the week is an annual celebration sponsored by the National Association for the Education of the Young Children. Its purpose is to focus the public's attention on the needs of young children and their families and to recognize early childhood programs and services that meet those needs, like daycare centers, home daycare providers, Head Start and pre-school programs, in the community.

She said she was, once again, going to need the city's help with some of the activities, such as putting picnic tables at Jamboree and Shop and Save, so that children can decorate paper bags; permission to draw on the city's sidewalks with chalk in front of the courthouse, city building and fire station; and help with blocking off part of State Street for a parade that will be held for daycare aged children from the Norton Christian Church to Washington

The street, she said, would only be blocked off for about an hour. As a safety precaution, she said, if a child doesn't have a parent, grandparent or guardian to walk with them, they can't walk in the

City Administrator Rob Lawson said he didn't see a problem with the city helping out on these projects. But, he said, they would have to have the parade approved by the Kansas Department of Transpor-

The council agreed and passed a motion to honor the requests made for the Week of the Young Child.

Hospital honored for its efforts

The Norton County Hospital was recognized by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Rural Development Fri-

Chuck Banks, the state director of Rural Development, said once a year, they recognize their good working partners. For 2006, one of those being recognized was the Norton hospital. The project the hospital is being recognized for is its 2003 multi-million dollar remodeling project, which took a cooperative effort of several organizations, including Rural Development and Prairie Land Electric.

"This is the only project being recognized in the state as a leveraged partner," he said. "It's the project that probably had the most leveraged parts with seven funding sources. Something like this took a real cooperative effort, so it shows a real success story."
