Dr. Delvin Randolph, 63, a 1961 graduate of Jennings High School, died March 9, 2007, at Hospice House in Hutchinson.

He was born March 15, 1943, at Oberlin, the son of Louis and Helen (Rhodes) Randolph. He was raised in Jennings and after he graduated from high school, he received a bachelor's degree from Kansas State University and a doctor of veterinary medicine degree from the College of Veterinary Medicine at Kansas State University.

Dr. Randolph married Barbara Harrison on Jan. 27, 1968, in Nickerson. He was the owner of Art Veterinary Clinic of Sterling and was also a farmer and rancher. He was a member of the United Methodist Church, American Veterinary Medical Association, Kansas Veterinary Medical Association and American Legion at Sterling. He was a veteran and served with the United States Army in the

Vietnam War.

He was preceded in death by his parents.

Survivors include his wife, Barbara; a son, Dr. Scott and Kristin Randolph; and a daughter, Dr. Debra Randolph-Zwick and Andy Zwick, all of Sterling; three grandchildren; two sisters, Betty Bailey, Middle Haddam, Conn., and Janis McDill, Mankato; and two brothers, Gaylen and Lennis Randolph, Jennings.


