It has withstood still another challenge. Since August of 2001, he newspaper at Hays — The Hays Daily News — has provided aily carrier delivery in the city of Norton. That will cease effective April 1.

In a letter to subscribers, The News explained "that it is too expensive for us to continue daily delivery to Norton due to a lack of interest in the paper and declining circulation numbers." Fuel costs also figured into their decision.

We found it strange that both the Hays paper and The Salina ournal were both delivered in Norton. Both are owned by the ame company.




