plan. Mr. Miller said he had not heard anything from Mr. Bennett and could only presume plans were progressing. The board briefly discussed fencing at the airport, the refueling station and a parallel taxiway.

Airport manager Delvis Miller reported to the board about a washed out area at the end of the runway. He was instructed to obtain a skid-steer loader and fill in the area. Mr. Miller also told the board that the airport's beacon is not functioning. He said, "It lights up, but does not go 'round". Mr. Miller said the beacon has had to

be repaired four times in the last 10 years at a cost of about \$2,000 each time. The board agreed to have Mr. Miller inquire of George Laliberte, the State Director of Aviation, if the airport would be eligible for some 9/11 funds to help with the beacon maintenance. In other business the board:
